In 1949, after the Arab-Israeli War and the occupation of Palestine, Pope Pius XII founded the Pontifical Mission for Palestine (PMP) as his special agency for relief and development in the Middle East. The Pontiff entrusted its leadership and administration to the Catholic Near East Welfare Association (CNEWA) in New York, USA. CNEWA was founded by Pope Pius XI in 1926 to support the work and activities of the Eastern churches in Northeast Africa, India and Eastern Europe.

PMP began implementing programs and projects through three regional offices in Beirut, Jerusalem and Amman.

After the 1967 war and the occupation of the West Bank and East Jerusalem, with the blessing of Pope Paul VI, PMP began supporting a network of community-based organizations (CBOs) and Church-affiliated institutions throughout the Holy Land.

PMP works for, through and with the local churches, allocating donor funds for programs and projects that support the foundation of the church and community leaders in Palestine and Israel. The Amman Regional Office overees projects in Jordan and Iraq while the Beirut Regional Office overees projects in Lebanon, Syria and Egypt.


Forward

Always attentive to our Catholic identity and the growing needs on the ground; in 2019, the Pontifical Mission in Jerusalem (PMP) continued to implement a wide variety of programs and projects that enhanced the work and service to the people of the Holy Land.

Highlights from the 2019 year include:

The commemoration of PMP's work 70-years on: On 18 June 2019, PMP commemorated 70 years of service in the Holy Land. The Apostolic Delegate to Jerusalem, Arch. Leopoldo Girelli, presided the celebration of the Eucharist at the Notre Dame of Jerusalem Center, followed by a brief presentation on PMP and its programs.

New survey on Christian youth to better understand the needs: During the year, PMP was actively involved in the preparation of a survey on the Christian youth in Jerusalem, a study commissioned by the



Coordinating Catholic Aid Organizations (CCAO). A meeting was held to disseminate the information to all participating youth institutions and sub-committees were formed to follow up with practical recommendations for various interventions.


New Educational Guidance program launch: PMP also launched the first well-designed educational guidance program at a number of schools in Jerusalem to help the youth make better educational choices, whether in their career fields or university of choice; based on their interests, skills and strengths rather than relying on grades. It also conducted a survey on the job market in Israel and especially in West Jerusalem, to improve the educational and career guidance program in the coming years.

Highlighting the mission's work to the Vatican: During the year, His Eminence Cardinal Leonardo Sandri, Prefect of the Congregation of Oriental Churches, His Excellency Archbishop Leopoldo Girelli, the Nuncio in Jerusalem as well as Monsignor Marco and Monsignor Thomas, visited PMP whereby the director and the staff made a presentation on the work of the mission.

Recognizing local challenges and uniting communities: On 20 September 2019, PMP held a conference on the challenges in the Palestinian curriculum - most importantly, the absence of historic events that show the diversity of the community, events that led to the formulation of diverse ethnic and religious groups, in addition to the absence of the Jewish and Christian history of Palestine. The conference was led by representatives in the local community and PMP partners, resulting in a series of meetings to help the Ministry of Education to effect change, while the church is revisiting religious education books. In addition, some gaps in education will be covered by the catechism programs.

Spreading hope, overcoming challenges and making a difference can be achieved only by joining efforts and working together hand in hand. PMP's continued strength lies in our solid and strong partnerships both with our partner donors and with our partner local institutions. To both, we offer our heartfelt thanks and appreciation for the wonderful cooperation throughout 2019.

2019 Program Review

Strengthen Church and Community based organizations

Pontifical Mission (PMP) is committed towards supporting a network of Church-affiliated institutions to develop and strengthen services and programs for the benefit of the people of the Holy Land. According to a study by Diyar Center, the Christian community in the Palestinian Territories, which constitute less than 2% of the total population, is responsible for over 45% of the total NGO sector such as schools, hospitals, social services, charitable societies and retirement homes. These institutions are operated under the careful guidance of the Sisters, Christian lay men and women and other administrations and provide a valuable service with Christian values at heart, to the population at large - Christian, Muslim and Jews, without distinction. They are essentially the "agents of evangelization" exemplifying Christian values - the essence the human values of dignity, tolerance, respect, acceptance,

charity and equality. The exchange between services and beneficiary is profound, thus having a significant impact in the lives of the beneficiaries.

Building resiliency of the Christian Communities

PMP realizes the immediate threat to the indigenous Christian community in the Middle East region, most importantly in the Holy Land – the birthplace of Christianity. The agency gives special attention to pastoral formation and education among Christian children and

youth, increasing the connection to the land and sense of belonging. PMP believes that by investing in the leadership skills among the youth today, children and youth will have the skills they need to be strong leaders in their communities.



Provide systematic assistance to youth programs

PMP believes that children and youth require a different educational approach in and outside the classroom. We work to help cultivate a creative learning environment at kindergartens and schools as well as local youth institutions. It is important that children and youth are provided with the opportunity develop essential critical and creative thinking skills, character and peer relationships at an early Misereor age. Provide assistance to children & youth

Within a span of three years, the extracurricular program has successfully combined capacity building training in strategic planning in addition to building support for creative youth programs that has reached a total of 24,056 Palestinian children and youth and 148 Palestinian public and private schools. Palestinian children and youth have participated in: environmental awareness and protection activities and campaigns (through Palestinian Wildlife Society); reading and researching, storytelling and creative writing campaigns and activities (through Yabous, Al-Saraya Centre and PMECC), educational activities and tutoring in school subjects like English, Math and Arabic (through Saraya Centre); researching, debate and leadership training (through AFKAR and ROSMUN program); theatre and the arts (through Siwar and ASHTAR).

According to the project's assessment study, the results indicated that the project:

- Reached a significant number of beneficiaries over the course of three years: children and youth (24,056) in East Jerusalem and the West Bank, where extracurricular programs are limited. –
- Helped the school administration and teachers realize that rote learning is outdated and that there are alternative ways of learning and thinking 'outside the box'.
- Supported specific educational opportunities for young people to learn, will most likely be permanent: establishment of eco-clubs (with first smartphone App on local wildlife), debate clubs, reading groups and drama clubs at a number of the participating schools as well as the first reading competition among a number of schools in Bethlehem with the possibility of becoming a national reading competition over the next three years.
- Helped strengthen the role of local partner institutions in the community and increase cooperation between them and other community representatives.





Positive changes on beneficiary children: -

When the project's consultant who is a psychologist, asked the children and youth groups, "What does it mean when they say, "this project has changed them a lot?" "How is that?" or "What was so special in it?" Some of the responses were:

F.M. (17 years old from Terra Santa School - Beit Sahour): "Lately, they chose representatives from each school that began meeting at the institution. Afterwards, we chose younger students to participate in the project in order to establish an eco-club at school that is run by teachers and we lead it."

D.A. (17 years old from a government school in Beit Sahour) who joined in the past year: "Today, I have a role in the group and I'm in charge of the media and photography. I somehow regret not having participated at the beginning of the project."

F.M. (16-year-old girl from Terra Santa School in Bethlehem) said: "I think that this project changed my personality, I became stronger. I guess that everyone who entered this project have gone through this change, I can feel it regarding my colleagues; we all discuss many topics together and are less shy".

Provide greater opportunities to decent employment

Unemployment rate for young graduates in Gaza currently stands at 47 percent and the job market is highly competitive with thousands of people applying for a work opportunity. PMP's Cash for Work and Training Employment Program, in partnership with Al-Ahli Arab Hospital, followed a cash-for-work scheme that provided on-the job training and a salary for unemployed high school and university graduates (both males and females) with four month to one-year contracts, over a three year period. The training curriculum devised by Al-Ahli Arab Hospital doctors, nurses and other staff included both theoretical and practical components, which according to the trainers and the trainees, helped expand valuable job skills and improved employability. The practicality of the on-the-job training element also provided trainees with "real life scenarios" working alongside hospital personnel and patients in addition sometimes difficult or stressful situations such as emergencies, which are frequently experienced by healthcare professionals working in high stressful work environments like hospitals. Doctor and nurse trainees also received additional on-the-job training from other healthcare providers in Gaza which also helped increase the number of hours gained for post-graduate training or residency – which is not accessible for most physicians in Gaza.

In total, the project has trained and employed 279 trainees; 20% of them were able to find temporary or permanent work after the project had ended. According to most trainees, the actual work experience at the hospital, and with the hospital staff and patients was an overall positive experience especially for female trainees, who felt that the program was empowering as it provided professional work experience and an income that supported their households.

Case Study Al-Ahli Arab Hospital

Dr. Khalil El Kahlout, lives in Jabaliya Refugee Camp - one of the most overpopulated and impoverished camps in Gaza, with his six brothers and sisters and his parents. Khalil was successful in high school, earning a 93 percent on the Tawjihi exam (matriculation).

Just six years into university, he finished his medical degree (M.B, Bch). Khalil returned to Gaza and completed a one-year internship, but it soon ended, and he began to job search like thousands of young graduates in Gaza. Khalil heard about the AAH Cashfor-Work Training and was accepted in the program.

Over a one-year period, Khalil was trained and employed in all of the main departments at AAH including the ER, Operating Theatre, Inpatient Department, and Outpatient Clinic. During his tenure, Khalil discovered that he had a keen interest in the Ear, Nose and Throat (ENT) field and had devoted many training hours with the AAH ENT consultant.

Once completing the one-year training program at AAH, Khalil found a temporary job at UNRWA with a promising salary of 1,800 USD/month; AAH has also offered a contract to Khalil to work part-time at the AAH when he is available.

On his experience at AAH, Khalil said: "Thanks to my experience at AAH and the dedication of its staff, I discovered my chosen career path as an ENT doctor, and at the same time, acquiring a permanent job at Hamad Hospital. The program was a really fruitful experience and it has opened new doors for me, which I am grateful for".


Enhance and improve access to better public facilities


PMP aims to help local community – based organizations (CBOs) in Israel and Palestine sustain services and programs for the public as many CBOs face problems such as severe financial constraints and fundraising capabilities, which further limits the ability to provide and sustain services in the long-term. With the support of donors, PMP provided financial support amounting to USD 714,476 for 26 local CBOs in 2019, that has enhanced and improved the facilities and services.

Grants enabled these institutions to procure needed equipment and rehabilitation work. Projects included the procurement of equipment helped advance healthcare at hospitals and a clinic, enhance learning environments in kindergartens and school classrooms and supported remodeling of a local library in Bethlehem.

















Pastoral Programs

In past few decades, Palestinian Christians have increasingly emigrated from the Holy Land. Churches and local humanitarian aid organizations have debated on the need to fight emigration rates by offering housing and employment opportunities for Christian families as a possible solution. However, over several generations it was found that Christian families who were financially or economically stable still emigrated abroad. The rising number of emigration rates throughout the Holy Land has created a need to find immediate solutions to the problem.

Christian leaders reflected on the root cause for Christian emigration in the Holy Land and discovered that it is the absence of the 'sense of belonging' to the Land of Jesus and preserve the Christian presence. Therefore, a new approach was needed to create a solid foundation – a sense of belonging for the new generation.

PMP's pastoral program aims to develop the sense of belonging among young people in the Palestinian Christian community in Palestine and in Israel. The program aims to provide financial support for children and youth programs at Churches and parishes, monasteries and seminaries, Christian youth centers, and the Christian scout movement. PMP's pastoral program specifically supports programs including catechetical programs and Sunday School programs, Bible summer camps for children and youth, an annual Bible competition as well as the Christian Scout movement. The program also supports rehabilitation projects on Churches and parishes.

In 2019, the pastoral program allocated USD 545,927 in donor contributions for 39 projects in Israel and Palestine. Projects implemented in Israel including the cities and villages of Kufr Yassif, Tel Aviv, Nazareth, Kafr Smei', Jaffa and Ramleh; and in Palestine, including East Jerusalem, and various areas of Ramallah, Bethlehem and Gaza.

Case Study:

St. Catherine's Church in Bethlehem

Every year, Fr. Emad Kamel, the vice parish priest of St. Catherine's Church in Bethlehem and the parishioners, have strived towards the enrichment of children's education and knowledge of the Bible through the Church's annual Bible Summer Camp program.

This year, PMP has provided a grant to ensure that 370 children from the Bethlehem area have an exciting, enjoyable camp experience. During the 2019 summer camp, children listened to Bible stories, sing hymns and songs, participate in theater and a kitchen lab as well as partake in other activities like field trips, swimming and dance.






The Youth of Jesus's Homeland are five annual Bible summer camps that consists of ten parishes spread across Jerusalem and the West Bank. These summer camps have been organized over several years and usually benefit around 500 children and youth of various age groups (6-35 years old). With support from CNEWA in 2019, five summer camp programs were launched, packed with activities, games, field trips to holy sites and discussions to help youth reconnect with the Gospel. PMP project coordinator Abeer Atallah visited one of the summer camps that hosted 80 Christian youth for 4 days in Jabal Nijme in Birzeit, and witnessed the great work the activities had on children and youth, helping them to reconnect with the Gospel and deepen their faith.

Case Study: West Bank Bible Competition

With the support of the Churches and the Christian community leaders, the PMP launched the first Bible competition through the schools in the West Bank to encourage the youth to read the Bible. This effort was expanded from the Bible Competition that was held in Israel, which began two years ago.

Emergency Aid & Relief- Healthcare Sector

Emergency assistance program usually provides funds to help mediate an emergency crisis. In 2019, the PMP recognized and prioritized healthcare sector, allocating donor funds to support healthcare partners in Gaza and in Bethlehem. – NECC Mother and Child Clinics, Al-Ahli Arab Hospital in Gaza and Al-Musinneen Elderly Care Center and Beit Sahour Cooperative in Bethlehem.

PMP provided a total of USD 220,120, that supported medical patients and the elderly.

During 2019, PMP collaborated with Al-Ahli Arab Hospital to provide medical treatment, medicine and food through a malnourishment program to help alleviate child malnourishment in children; a health care fund for the poor and elderly by covering medical expenses and healthcare costs as well as diagnostic care for women at risk of breast cancer.

Through local partner Near East Council of Churches (NECC) Mother and Child Clinics, psychosocial service program including individual and group counseling was offered to at-risk children and adults. 'Open days' or a family day-out were also offered for patients as well as staff and VTC students of

NECC.

Through local partners in Bethlehem -Al-Musinneen Elderly Care Center and Beit Sahour Cooperative in Bethlehem, mothers and children were provided with medicine and covered medical expenses in addition to rehabilitating a storage room at the elderly care center.

Subsidized Institutions

PMP maintains its commitment to support three public institutions in the health and education sectors: Near East Council of Churches Mother and Child Clinics (NECC) in Gaza, Pope Paul VI Ephpheta Institute for the Deaf in Bethlehem, and the Pontifical Mission Educational and Cultural Center (PMECC), also in Bethlehem.

Paul VI Ephpheta Institute, Bethlehem

There are only 12 institutions for deaf persons in the Palestinian territories where most of these schools are in the northern district and provide a formal education for children up to the age of 14 years old; Ephpheta is operated by the Sisters of Saint Dorothy and is the only school that allows students to continue their formal education to the 12th grade. Ephpheta's staff are comprised of 13 speech therapists, audiologists, social workers as well as 50 teachers trained in the field of oral deaf education and auditory-verbal therapy, provide 185 deaf students with a valuable education for life. The school also provides support programs for parents and family members of the deaf where they have access to counseling services, advocacy training and guidance in related health and other issues on how to raise a deaf child. Moreover, Ephpheta also provides boarding for 23 students who come from areas beyond Bethlehem where access is severely restricted by checkpoints and other road blocks that make traveling to and from school extremely difficult. In 2019, CNEWA supported the operating costs of the Ephpheta Institute which covered employee salaries for the year, minor maintenance work and upkeep of facilities.

PM Educational & Cultural Center, Bethlehem

Bethlehem Governorate serving a population of over 220,000 people, with over 20,000 refugees living in three refugee camps: Dheisheh, Aida and Beit Jibrin. There are around 170 public and private schools operating in the Governorate. With such a large, young population, there are no school libraries and only a few public libraries available for students.

The Pontifical Mission Educational and Cultural Center (PMECC) was established in 1970 as a small library to cater to all children and youth who lacked access to a library, whether in their school or the public library. The Sisters and with the support of its team, created after-school programs and a summer camp program for children and youth that uses 'hands-on learning approach' and tools in its programs which help school-aged children and youth to learn better. Children and youth can sign up for guitar lessons, creative writing, educational games competitions, film-viewings and discussion sessions, among other activities. In the summer, children and youth can participate in fun and interactive activities with peers through the summer camp program. For parents – especially working parents, the center's programs are both educational and free, which lifts the burden of finding quality programs and paying a fee which many parents cannot afford.

NECC Mother and Child Clinics, Gaza

The lack of a national healthcare system and lack of health insurance in Gaza puts 2 million Gaza residents at risk. NECC Mother and Child Clinics is part of a network of Gaza's non-government organizations and medical institutions that provide free healthcare and wellbeing programs; NECC specifically targets mothers and their children (especially those that are non-refugee and ineligible for medical insurance by the UNWRA) and are often denied access to healthcare due to their non-refugee status. Medical prevention and care at NECC include prenatal and antenatal care are provided annually, including home follow-up visits, dental and access to educational workshops, which require donor funding annually.
